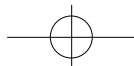


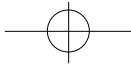
A LIGHT IN THE CITY

The origin of the text in today's opening hymn is a poem known as the "Canticle of the Sun" written by Francis of Assisi in 1225. Albert Edward Bailey, in *The Gospel in Hymns*, reports "Francis, blind and quite ill, took his place at the monastery table. The meal had had hardly begun when suddenly he seemed to be rapt away in ecstasy, which lasted for several minutes. Then coming to himself, he cried 'Praise be to God!' He had just composed the 'Canticle of the Sun.'"
