John Milton wrote "Let Us with a Gladsome Mind," a paraphrase of Psalm 136, while a student at St. Paul's School, London. He was fifteen. It was published in 1645 and originally had twenty-four stanzas. John Milton (1608-1674) was an English Puritan and worked in the government of Oliver Cromwell. Milton suffered from weak eyes all his life; at age forty-four he became totally blind. His greatest literary works, *Paradise Lost* (1667), *Paradise Regained* and *Samson Agonistes* (both 1671), were dictated to others in this later period.
