



This evening's Vespers service, which celebrates the lives of those who have died in the past year, features Maurice Duruflé's *Requiem* performed by the Morning Choir. Duruflé, who served as organist at St. Etienne-du-Mont in Paris from 1930 until his death in 1986, composed *Requiem* in 1947 in memory of his father. His only large-scale and perhaps his best-known work, *Requiem*, like much of the rest of Duruflé's music, is based largely on plainsong and its associated modal scales; the original Gregorian chant of the Mass of the Dead forms the foundation of each movement.
