While the chant for "O Come, O Come" was written in the fifteenth century, the words of this Advent hymn date back to the twelfth century.

In the morning, Johann Sebastian Bach's *Magnificat* will be performed by the Morning Choir, with chamber orchestra, at the 9:30 and 11:00 worship services.

In the evening, the annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols will be celebrated at 6:30 p.m. Vespers, followed by a reception hosted by Presbyterian Women in Fourth Church.
