

The Magnificat, Mary's song of praise from Luke 1:46-55 (a song that begins with the words "My soul magnifies the Lord," hence the name "Magnificat"), has been set to music by countless composers. Johann Sebastian Bach's setting of the text was first performed on the evening of Christmas Day 1723 by the choir of Leipzig's St. Thomas Church. At the time, Bach was unrecognized as a composer of any stature, and St. Thomas Church was a comparatively poor church. Yet the Magnificat sung that night has become one of the greatest choral works ever written.
