

The "Chorale in A Minor," today's prelude, was César Franck's final composition, written just before his death in 1890. Born in 1822 in Belgium, at age eleven Franck toured that country as a pianist. He studied at the Paris Conservatory, and although his training was in piano and composition, in 1858 Franck became organist of Sainte Clotilde in Paris. His outstanding ability to improvise drew listeners from far and wide, including Franz Liszt, who in 1866 likened Franck's skill to that of Bach. Franck elevated the status of organ music in Paris and developed a style of playing the organ as if it were an orchestra. That style has influenced generations since. "Chorale in A Minor," the last of three such chorales, is not based on an existing chorale tune, such as a hymn melody, but instead returns again and again to a chorale of Franck's own writing.
