
Just as I am.... Though the words sound lachrymose to many, for me they still convey a sense of comfort and assurance. Was I really acceptable to God "just as I am?" Was it really true that I needed no improvements, no alterations, that I could enter the presence of the Most High, the terrifying *mysterium tremendum* just as I am? If true, that was very good news to an adolescent who was always being reminded of my shortcomings and defects. But God accepted me just as I am? That was not judgment but good news. Years later when I read Paul Tillich's famous sermon "You Are Accepted" I could hear the melody of the old hymn still humming on in the back of my mind.
