God gets our attention through tragedy and terror \dots ; yet in and through them we ask questions, we are more responsive to revelations of truth. \dots God does not send the terror or the tragedy to do this, but he uses the terror and the tragedy and even the death of God himself on the cross even as he uses the sublime and the beautiful, the mysterious and the rational. All of these are used to get our attention, to get through thickheaded but goodhearted people; and life can begin only when God gets our attention and we are in a position to hear what God has to say.
