Also known as the Lesser Doxology, its trinitarian language comes from Matthew 28:19, the commissioning of the disciples: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." The tune accompanying these ancient words was composed by Henry Wellington Greatorex in 1851. Greatorex (1813-1858), who was English, came to the United States in 1836 to serve as organist of churches in New Haven, Connecticut, and New York City.
