The framers of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights could not possibly have envisioned the scope of religious diversity in America at the beginning of the twenty-first century. When they wrote the sixteen words of the First Amendment, “Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof,” they unquestionably did not have Buddhism in mind. But the principles they articulated—the “nonestablishment” of religion and the “free exercise” of religion have provided a sturdy rudder through the past two centuries as our religious diversity has expanded. After all, religious freedom is the fountainhead of religious diversity. The two go inextricably together. Step by step we are beginning to claim and affirm what the framers of the Constitution did not imagine but equipped us to embrace.

The music in today's worship spans nearly two and one-half centuries of American music. James Bremner (d. 1780) came to America in 1763 and was an organist and music teacher in Philadelphia. Among his pupils was Francis Hopkinson, who was one of the signers of the Constitution. John Knowles Paine (1839-1906) was one of the finest organists in the United States and was also the first to travel to Germany for his musical education. Most of the great organ works of J. S. Bach, not then widely known in America, were introduced here through Paine's playing and teaching. The anthems, also by prominent American musicians, are presented in support of all people courageously facing life-threatening challenges.
