I am standing on a moderately crowded subway car reading a paperback when I look up and see a man about my age who is standing a few feet away and staring at me with disconcerting intensity. For an instant we gaze speechlessly into each other's eyes. I expect him to say (as sometimes happens) that he has read one of my books and recognizes me from my dust-jacket photo. Instead he asks me a question. "Are you a Christian?" The question takes me aback, although I know why he has asked it. I am reading *Rescuing the Bible from Fundamentalism*, . . . [and he] has probably noticed the word "Bible" which is in large type. "Are you a Christian?" It's not as easy a question as it may sound.
