

Fourth Presbyterian Church's stained-glass windows were designed by Charles Connick of Boston. Those on the north and south sides of the Sanctuary were made in the thirteenth-century manner known as grisaille.



SANCTUARY WINDOW UNDERGOING REPAIR

The west stained-glass window in the Sanctuary was removed this past week and taken to Bovard Studio for releading. The leading in the Sanctuary windows has been deteriorating over time, and earlier this year stained-glass consultants advised that the repair process not be delayed. Thus, the Board of Trustees authorized that repairs begin immediately. The west window, which is in the most critical condition, was selected as the first to be releaded. It is anticipated that repairing this window will take from twelve to sixteen weeks, after which it will be reinstalled.
