God's feeding of his creatures is not a lesser act than creation or redemption. It is an enterprise of the same energy from which these movements flow. Creation is an onward event—there is the child that is being conceived at this moment, the rose that is opening, the melody that is wooing the composer. And redemption, though radiating through the specific event of the cross, is not tethered to the day of the nails and the wood—it was present in the great Passover and is expressed repeatedly unto our midst today by Word and Sacrament.






