Vespers Requiem: In memory and honor of all departed loved ones, the Morning Choir will sing *Requiem* by Herbert Howells at this evening's Vespers. Herbert Howells (1892-1983) wrote the requiem in 1936, a short time after his son died of spinal meningitis at the age of nine. For personal reasons, he did not release it for public performance until 1980. An extremely beautiful and intimate work, it does not include the traditional text of a requiem. Instead it focuses on scriptural words of comfort and encouragement for the living.
