here are, Vaclav Havel once said, different ways of waiting. There is waiting without carrying hope within ourselves: sitting, waiting for salvation to come from the outside. At the other end of the spectrum are those who wait with faith and who fight for truth even when they are defeated and beaten back a hundred times. This is the kind of waiting that sends forth seeds out of which change and progress may one day grow. The difference is between waiting for lilies to appear that have never been planted and doing your utmost to help good seeds find nourishment in rocky soil.

But a personal conversion experience on Pentecost Sunday in 1738, under the influence of the Moravians, gave him "rest in his soul" and released in him the gift of hymn writing. He is known to have written more than 6,000 hymns and perhaps as many as 6,500. Although he dedicated his life to the Methodist movement, he never relinquished his ordination in the Church of England.
