

Music Note: Tomás Luis de Victoria (1548-1611), composer of the Communion anthem sung at the 9:30 and 11:00 services, was born in Avila, Spain. He studied music in Rome and eventually succeeded Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (1525-1594), composer of the morning offertory anthem, as Maestro di cappella at the Roman Seminary in 1571. Victoria became a priest in 1575 and served as a pastor in Rome until 1594, when he returned to Spain to be both organist and priest at a convent in Madrid.
