This longed-for simplicity on the other side of complexity reveals itself in care for one another and for the earth, and is the whole thrust of servant leadership. Grounded in love of the "Servant God" as the power that spins the stars, servant leadership is a life-giving simplicity within the world's complexity.

The text of today's opening hymn, "All Glory, Laud, and Honor," was written by Theodulph of Orleans around the year 820 to be used as a Palm Sunday processional hymn. Born around 750 or 760 in Spain or Italy, Theodulph of Orleans was in a monastery at Florence when discovered by Charlemagne and brought to France in 781 and made Abbot of Fleury and Bishop of Orleans. He was later imprisoned for conspiring against King Louis the Pious. Although legend has it that Theodulph was freed when the king passed the prison and heard him singing this hymn, it is more probable that Theodulph died in prison in 821.
