October is stewardship season at Fourth Church, a time when we celebrate the individual and collective gifts that together support the operations, mission, and ministry of the congregation. It is during this month that the Stewardship Committee asks you to offer your pledge for 2003.

- ◆ Our annual operating budget for 2003 will be \$7.5 million. Our endowment proceeds can provide for only 40 percent of that budget. Another 40 percent must come from member pledges and gifts. (The remaining 20 percent comes from program fees.)
- ◆ Fifty percent of your gifts support our ministries of Christian worship, education, and evangelism.
- ◆ In addition, your pledges and gifts support our mission programs, such as the Center for Older Adults, the Elam Davies Social Service Center, the Center for Whole Life, the Tutoring Program, and the Lorene Replogle Counseling Center.

- ◆ A pledge reflects the need to put God first, that God's mission and kingdom are vital to our lives.
- ◆ Pledging enables Fourth Presbyterian Church to plan its income for the upcoming year. It allows us to guarantee funding for existing programs as well as to generate new ones.
