First Sunday of Advent



Christian eschatology, like Jewish eschatology before it, makes a claim about the future in which the creator of the world at the beginning is fully revealed as the world's redeemer at the end. Eschatology is more a matter of *who* than *when*. "The end" is not so much a matter of chronology (*when*) but rather a debate over who, in the end, is in charge. Or, as H. Richard Niebuhr put it, eschatology "does not lie in the time-factor so much as on the God-factor." The hope for the coming of Christ in fullness has nothing to do with the hope engendered by wishful thinking, a positive mental attitude or creative social programming. Our hope is grounded in the promise of God and in our weekly celebration [of] that promise in our Sunday worship.







Worship Notes

Today is World AIDS Day, a day when we join others around the globe in remembering the many who suffer because of this disease. World AIDS Day will be a particular focus of this evening's worship service.

The **bulletin cover art** depicts angels praising God with harp and string, as Psalm 150 calls us to do. These angels appear in a stained-glass window, designed by Charles J. Connick, located in the reception area west of Anderson Hall.

The **Advent banners**, in the form of wings, convey the idea of Advent stillness and of waiting in the presence of angels. They were designed and painted by Eliza Linely of Berkeley, California.

The **stewardship banners** hanging in the sanctuary are revealed as member pledges are received, indicating our communal pledge to be a light in the city through the mission and ministries of Fourth Church. These cityscape banners were designed for the Stewardship 2003 campaign by California-based liturgical artist Nancy Chinn.

THE LORD'S SUPPER AT FOURTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

"Do this in remembrance of me." Luke 14: 19 (NRSV)

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper (also called Communion) is an occasion for the family of faith to gather around a common table and share symbolically a time of eating and drinking in communion with the crucified and risen Lord. In this act, we remember that during his earthly ministry, Jesus shared meals with his followers and sat at dinner tables as a sign of acceptance of the sinner and the outcast. In the last meal before his death, Jesus shared with his disciples bread and wine, speaking of these elements as his body and blood, symbols of the new relationship with God brought about by his impending death. On the day of his resurrection, the risen Jesus made himself known to his followers in the breaking of bread.

In the act of remembering that is the Lord's Supper, we receive and trust the love of Christ present to us and to the world. Through this symbolic meal, we are renewed and empowered to be the church, the body of Christ, in the world.

The invitation to the Lord's Supper is not just for Presbyterians or "members of the church." All who confess Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord are invited to partake of the

Lord's Supper. Access to the Table is not a right conferred upon the worthy but a privilege given to the undeserving who come in faith, repentance, and love. Even one who doubts or whose trust is wavering may receive the bread and grape juice (in place of wine) in order to be assured of God's love and grace in Jesus Christ.

At our morning communion services, the congregation is served in the pews by elders and deacons in an act symbolizing their role as servant leaders in the church. The congregation also takes on the role of servers as worshipers pass the trays of bread and grape juice to those seated beside them. The congregation partakes of the elements as they are served. Empty glasses are placed in the ringed holes in the pew racks.

Fourth Presbyterian Church celebrates the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper each Sunday at evening worship and at morning worship on the first Sunday of even-numbered months.
