

**Ron White, Author of the Book
Lincoln's Greatest Speech: The Second Inaugural,
to Preach Sunday, March 2 at 6:30 p.m.**

Abraham Lincoln's Second Inaugural Address, delivered on March 4, 1865, is perhaps best known for its line "with malice toward none, with charity for all." In his 2002 book, *Lincoln's Greatest Speech: The Second Inaugural*, Presbyterian pastor Ron White takes a close look at not only those words but the entire speech, as he explores the impact that address has had.

Author of five books on topics of American intellectual, religious, and social history, Ron White is currently Professor of American Intellectual and Religious History and Dean at San Francisco Theological Seminary. He previously taught at Colorado College, Whitworth College, Princeton Theological Seminary, and UCLA.

On Sunday, March 2, Fourth Church has the privilege of welcoming Ron White to its pulpit for 6:30 p.m. Vespers. At 4:30 p.m. that afternoon, he will also be available for informal group conversation. Please join us for this special opportunity next Sunday.
