

Dr. White, a Presbyterian pastor, is the author of *Lincoln's Greatest Speech: The Second Inaugural* and four other books on topics of American intellectual, religious, and social history. Currently Professor of American Intellectual and Religious History and Dean at San Francisco Theological Seminary, he also has taught at Colorado College, Whitworth College, Princeton Theological Seminary, and UCLA.
