

Giovanni Gabrieli (1557-1612), the composer of today's 9:30 and 11:00 postlude, was organist at St. Mark's in Venice. He published two volumes of his sacred music, the *Sacrae Symphoniae*. Today's postlude is from the 1597 collection and demonstrates Gabrieli's dramatic use of dynamics, "pian e forte," or "soft and loud."
