During Today's Worship

Large-print bulletins, Bibles, and hymnals and individual listening devices for improved sound are available in the back of the sanctuary. Worship also can be heard through the "T" setting of hearing aids.

Parking is available Sundays at the John Hancock Center, 875 North Michigan Avenue (access Chestnut Street), at the rate of \$7.00 for three hours and at 900 North Michigan (access from Rush or Walton Street) at the rate of \$7.75 to 4:00 p.m. and \$6.00 after 5:00 p.m. Validation tickets for 900 parking must be picked up during Coffee Hour or from the Chestnut Street reception desk. Hancock tickets must be validated in the Narthex, at the back of the sanctuary.



WORSHIP NOTES

This morning's services use the Opening and Closing Prayers from the 218th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) on June 22, 2008.

Fanny Mendelssohn Hensel (1805–1847), the composer of today's postlude, was considered more talented than her younger brother, Felix Mendelssohn, even by her own family. However, her family discouraged her career in music due to the customs of the time. Her husband, Wilhelm Hensel, encouraged her to publish her compositions and become a concert pianist.

The women of the Morning Choir will be singing at morning worship services in July. The men of the Morning Choir will sing during August, and the full choir will return in September.

On the cover: The bulletin cover shows an architectural detail from the Fourth Church spire. This angel on the Michigan Avenue facade echoes the text of Psalm 150: "Praise God with trumpet sound. . . . Let everything that breathes praise the Lord!"
