WORSHIP NOTES

Part of this morning's prelude was composed by James Bremner and William Selby, who were among the first composers in America. Both men were active during the American Revolution, Bremner as organist at Christ Church in Philadelphia and Selby as organist at King's Chapel in Boston.

The men of the Morning Choir will be singing during morning worship services in July. The women of the Morning Choir will sing in August, and the full choir will return in September.

The textile banners and pulpit parament, "Unweavings" created by Laurie Wohl, were commissioned by Fourth Church for use during the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, the longest season of the church year (the season between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent). Through their combination of scripture texts and image, these banners celebrate and elevate the perception of the sacred in the "ordinary" as we make our faith journey day to day.
