Domestic Violence Affects All of Us

Women often are the victims of domestic violence and other forms of abuse, but they aren't the only ones at risk. Every year in the United States, more than 800,000 men are physically or sexually assaulted by a male or female intimate partner. When it happens, men can feel guilt, shame, or anger—just as women do.

Beyond Arguing

Most relationships occasionally go through tough times, resulting in arguments and tension. But abuse is different—it's a pattern of one person using fear and intimidation to gain power and control over another person. Abuse isn't always physical—it can include isolation and emotional, psychological, sexual, or economic tactics as well.

It's OK to Ask for Help

If you've been living with abuse, you may find yourself doubting your own judgment. Men who are abused may not seek help because they're embarrassed or afraid that no one will believe them, or they may just hope things will get better.

Abuse often gets worse over time; it can cause chronic health problems, such as post-traumatic stress disorder, depression, and headaches. It also can lead to injury or death. Children who witness abuse may develop health, behavioral, and developmental problems.

Within the United States, one out of every four American women will experience violence by an intimate partner during her lifetime. The purple ribbons on the trees on North Michigan Avenue represent the thousands of individuals who are the victims of domestic violence each year. Domestic violence impacts everyone—women and their families, the workplace, and the community. No one is immune.

During Today's Worship

All, including children, are invited to the Lord's Table to receive Communion, which is served by intinction. The congregation will come forward by the center aisle to receive the bread (gluten-free bread is available in the paper "cup" within the basket of bread), which they will then dip into the chalice of nonalcoholic grape juice. Worshipers will return to their pews by the side aisles.
