Paul Hindemith (1895-1963) composed Sonata No. 2 for organ in 1937. Having left his native Germany in 1935 when Nazi officials banned his music, he joined the faculty of Yale University in 1940, later returning to Europe in 1953. Although Hindemith's music was considered modernistic before World War II, his views on the function of music are essentially romantic. The Second Sonata is more or less neoclassical in its form, using his style of counterpoint as its basis.
