

The text of the opening hymn, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing," was written by Robert Robinson around the year 1758. Robinson (1735-1790), who was born in Norfolk, England, was a barber. After attending an evangelistic service, he began to work for evangelical revivals and later became a Baptist minister. In the second stanza of this hymn he refers to an "Ebenezer," which is the name of the memorial stone set up by Samuel after the victory at Mizpah (1 Samuel 7). Robinson uses the term as an allusion to the text "Thus far the Lord has helped us" (1 Samuel 7:12).
