e can be sure that wherever the work of justice, freedom, and enlightenment is being done, the initiative for the work and the power for the work come from the Holy Spirit. Wherever people bravely bear witness to the truth, whenever people lay down their lives for one another, there the Spirit of God is operative. . . . God's realm is not confined to the church. The world is the realm of God, who, as Holy Spirit, is inspiring and empowering wherever the Spirit sees fit. In other words, the Spirit is at work through, outside, and sometimes in spite of the church. The realistic acceptance of this all-too-evident truth need not be a cause for despair. Instead it might save the church from the dangers of grandiosity and pride. . . . Just as there is no warrant for self-congratulation, there is no reason to fear failure.


