

Worship Notes: The banners and pulpit parament celebrate Ordinary Time, the season of the church year that falls between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent. These hangings, created by Laurie Wohl, are intended to elevate the perception of the sacred in the "ordinary" as we make our faith journey day to day.

The composers of this morning's preludes and postlude, Louis-Nicolas Clérambault (1676-1749) and Marcel Dupré (1886-1971), were also known as performers. Both served as organists at St. Sulpice in Paris, and during his career, Dupré played more than 2000 organ recitals. In addition to writing 25 cantatas, Clérambault wrote 2 suites for the organ. Today's postlude is taken from one of those suites.

Sponsor a City Lights Summer Day Student


At the end of the Tutoring Program in May, one of the students was asked what he would be doing this summer. “Nothing. Just staying inside,” was his reply. When asked why, he said, “I live in a bad neighborhood and I don’t want to get involved with the gangs.”

City Lights Summer Day helps answer the question of how we keep kids off the streets and safe during the summer. A program of Partners in Education, City Lights has been a summer fixture at Fourth Church for the past 10 years. It serves students in grades one to eight, many of whom participate in the school-year Tutoring Program. For four weeks, beginning July 8, approximately 100 students from Cabrini-Green and surrounding neighborhoods meet Monday to Friday for academics, creative activities, service projects, and field trips.

This program is made possible through gifts sponsoring students: each gift of \$100 enables one student to participate in the program.
