

Worship Notes

The composer of the prelude "Procesión y Saeta," José Jesús Estrada, is considered one of Mexico's finest writers of organ and choral music. Born in 1898, he studied in Rome before returning to Mexico in 1935. From then until his death in 1980 he was organ professor at the National Conservatory in Mexico City.

The banners and paraments on the lectern and pulpit convey the Easter joy of the resurrection. They were designed by Nancy Chinn.

The needlepoint panels and cross recently installed in the chancel were conceived and stitched by Morgan Simmons, Fourth Church organist and choirmaster for twenty-eight years and Fourth Church member. They were presented by him as his gift to the church. The sheaves of wheat in the panels symbolize Jesus as the bread of life, and the clusters of grapes reflect the atoning blood of Christ. These panels honor the ministry of Joanna Adams, just as the upper chancel seat cushions, also the work of Morgan Simmons, honor the ministries of Fourth Church pastors John Timothy Stone, Harrison Ray Anderson, Elam Davies, and John M. Buchanan.

The Fourth Church stained-class windows, depicted on the bulletin cover, were designed by Charles J. Connick of Boston. The north and south sanctuary windows were made in the thirteenth-century manner known as grisaille.
