That is the only reality: that God's love is the only thing that makes sense out of suffering, conflict, and tragedy. God's love does not do away with suffering, conflict, and tragedy: the cross should teach us that. God's love does not do away with it; God's love is the thing that makes it possible to bear it, to see it, to share in it, to understand it, and to pass through it. That is the truth of the Gospel, that is the essence of the Passion.



# A SERMON SERIES FOR LENT

When the authors of the New Testament books of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John recorded and presented their experience of the gospel, the good news of Jesus Christ, they devoted an inordinate amount of space to the last week of Jesus' life. The Gospel of Matthew devotes fully one-third of its pages to the events in Jerusalem that occurred in the seven days from Palm Sunday to Easter—Holy Week. And of that, two full chapters are devoted to twenty-four hours, the time between the Last Supper on Thursday evening and the crucifixion the next day around noon.

Today's sermon, as well as four other 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. sermons in Lent, will be based on several of the incidents and personalities that appear in the account of Jesus' final twenty-four hours. I invite you to prepare for worship this Lent by reading and rereading chapters 26 and 27 of the Gospel According to Matthew and then focusing on each specific text weekly.
