## Worship Notes

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THE TEXT of this morning's first anthem was written on a basement wall in Cologne, Germany, by an anonymous Jewish person hiding during World War II.

The text of the Offertory Anthem was written by the Canadian lieutenant John McCrae in 1915 after witnessing the death of a close friend, who was killed at the Second Battle of Ypres. After reading the poem at his friend's funeral McCrae threw the manuscript away, but fellow soldiers retrieved it. It was published later that year and became one of the most famous poems to come out of the Great War, which ended 100 years ago today. The poem is written from the point of view of the dead soldiers, and its opening lines refer to the many poppies that were the first flowers to grow in the churned-up earth of soldiers' graves in Flanders, a region of Belgium. It is because of this poem that poppies are associated with the toll of World War I.
