Although wearing a mask is not required at Fourth Church, we as a community have made a commitment to be a mask-welcoming campus, encouraging the wearing of masks by anyone who wants or needs to wear one. As a mask-welcoming campus, we remain committed to ensuring no one will feel out of place should they choose to wear a mask while at Fourth Church.

** In the Sanctuary, the front section on the pulpit side is for those required to or choosing to practice social distancing, and everyone sitting in that section is required to wear a mask. The remainder of the Sanctuary is open seating.



For those who prefer to worship online or who are unable to join us in person, we livestream our morning service at 10:00 a.m. on our YouTube channel (www.bit.ly/fpcvideos), where the service is also available for viewing afterwards. (On Easter Sunday, the livestream will begin with the prelude at 8:45 a.m. and will be available for viewing any time afterwards.) ** Those without Internet access are invited to listen via phone by calling 888.916.9166 at the time of the livestreamed service.

We ask all who are worshiping with us to **let us know you are here by filling out an information form,** which also ensures we have current contact information. Those worshiping with us via livestream will find **a link to the online form—which takes only 20 seconds to complete!**—included in the descriptive text below the video (*if you are viewing full screen, you will need to briefly exit full-screen view to see the description and link*); a QR code is also displayed during the "Welcome and Announcements" that can be scanned with a phone camera to take you to the form. Those worshiping with us in person are asked to use the **information pads in the pews,** passing them down the pew so worshipers have opportunity to greet one another by name following the service.



If you would like to join us for in-person worship, we gather each Sunday at 10:00 a.m. in the Sanctuary (except on Easter Sunday, when we will instead gather at 9:00 and 11:00 a.m.) and at 4:00 p.m. for our Jazz at Four service (with Communion) in Buchanan Chapel. ** To receive our Jazz at Four email newsletter, with information about that afternoon service, subscribe at www.bit.ly/ jazzatfournews ** On Sundays the doors open for worship a half hour prior to the service. For the Jazz at Four service, access is only by the Delaware doors to the Gratz Center. ** Sunday parking is available at 900 N. Michigan (access from Rush or Walton) at the rate of \$9 for 6 hours between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. (and \$18 for up to 12 hours) and at the Hancock garage (875 N. Michigan, enter from Delaware or Chestnut) at the rate of \$10 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Validation tickets for the garages must be picked up from an usher. ** Children are always welcome in worship. If you need to step out to comfort your child, the Hospitality Suite, located on the second floor of the Gratz Center, is available as a quiet space for families where worship is livestreamed. During the morning service nursery care is also available on the fourth floor of the Gratz Center. ** Worship can be heard in the Sanctuary through the "T" or "T-coil" setting of hearing aids. ** Please silence electronic devices during worship.



Following worship, a pipe organ tour begins at 11:15 a.m. at the front of the Sanctuary. ** Also following worship, Deacons are available in Stone Chapel (through the door to the right of the pulpit) to pray with individuals who would like to offer prayers of praise or concern. ** We gather on Wednesdays at 9:30 a.m. for Morning Prayer via Zoom and at 10:00 a.m. for in-person Morning Prayer in Buchanan Chapel. For Zoom details, email Nancy Benson-Nicol (nbenson-nicol@fourthchurch.org). ** The Chapel is open for opportunity to walk the labyrinth between 1:00 and 3:00 p.m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. For details, email Rocky Supinger (rsupinger@fourthchurch.org). ** A Sacred Pause time of meditation is hosted virtually by our Replogle Center for Counseling and Well-Being at facebook.com/reploglecenterforcounselingandwellbeing on Tuesdays (7:45 a.m.) and also Saturdays (8:30 a.m.).

Each Sunday during Lent we have been extinguishing a candle at the front of the Sanctuary. Just as we lit candles on the Advent wreath to symbolize the light coming into the world through the birth of Christ, so now our extinguishing of candles points to the Lenten progression from light to the shadows of Good Friday and the crucifixion.



Also during Lent our worship includes the Exchange of Peace. In the Reformed tradition this follows the Declaration of Pardon and is a response to God's forgiveness. This exchange of signs and words of unity and of Christ's peace is an ancient greeting of siblings in Christ. It is a time when we extend to one another what we ourselves have received from God in Christ. You might simply say "The peace of Christ be with you" or "Peace be with you," the greeting of Jesus Christ to his disciples after his resurrection. By exchanging the Peace of Christ to one another, we witness to God's reconciling love.



Today we continue the sermon series "I believe ..."—an opportunity for us to take **a closer look at the Apostles' Creed,** which we use as one of our Affirmations of Faith. If you have ever wondered why we often say this ancient creed in worship, have found yourself pausing after stating "I believe," or maybe have at times thought that perhaps you did not believe all of the phrases, we hope you will continue to join us in worship this Lent and Eastertide as we explore what we believe together.

The season of Lent and Holy Week calls Christians to embrace the faith journey by reflecting upon and deepening their relationship with God and by acting upon their Christian beliefs. We are invited to take up the gifts of faith—worship, study, prayer, and service—in preparation for Christ's journey to the cross. On this Sunday when we wave palms and sing loud hosannas, those worshiping with us online are encouraged to download, print, and **color a palm** from our website (www.bit.ly/coloringpalm). Today's Palm Sunday celebration will then lead us into Jesus' Passion and to **Holy Week.** We invite you to join us in pausing to observe those solemn days.



On Wednesday evening, April 5 we will release our Holy Week "Rhythm and Word" video. This 10-minute worship experience weaves together scripture, prayer, and music and can be found after 6:00 p.m. Wednesday on our YouTube channel (www.bit.ly/fpcvideos) ₩ On April 6, **Maundy Thursday**, we will gather in the Sanctuary for a 12:10 p.m. Communion service that will include optional footwashing and a 7:30 p.m. Tenebrae service, also with Communion. This evening service follows the ancient Office of Tenebrae (from the Latin for "shadows"). The service portrays the progression from light to darkness in the passion of Jesus, beginning with his abandonment on Thursday and concluding with his crucifixion. The service ends with the Sanctuary in complete darkness." The 7:30 p.m. Tenebrae service will be livestreamed. ☀ On April 7 we will observe **Good Friday** with a Good Friday service at 12:10 p.m. in the Sanctuary; a 5:30 p.m. program in Buchanan Chapel for children and families; and a 7:30 p.m. Choral Service featuring the Morning Choir singing works including Allegri's *Miserere*; the 7:30 p.m. service will be livestreamed. * On Saturday we will hold an **Easter Vigil** at 7:00 p.m. (*in person only*), for which we will be joined by our friends from First Presbyterian Church. Beginning with kindling a fire in the Michigan Avenue courtyard, we will move into the Sanctuary, where we will hear readings that cover the story of salvation, from creation through redemption, and join in sacred song.



On Easter Sunday we will gather for four services: 6:30 a.m. Sunrise Service at Oak Street Beach, with Communion; 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. Easter services in the Sanctuary; and 4:00 p.m. Easter Jazz at Four in Buchanan Chapel, with Communion. ** The 9:00 a.m. Easter service will be livestreamed, with the prelude beginning around 8:45 a.m., and will be available to watch anytime later that morning or afterwards. ** Entrance for the 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. Easter services will be only through the glass Loggia doors on Michigan Avenue, next to the courtyard. Seating will begin a half hour prior to each of those two services. ** There will be no socially distanced seating at any of the Easter services. We invite those who prefer to practice social distancing to join us in worship outdoors for the sunrise service or online for the 9:00 a.m. service. ** An Easter program for children will be held in the Gratz Center at 9:00 a.m. on Easter Sunday; nursery care will be available between 8:30 a.m. and 12:15 p.m. ** See www.fourthchurch.org/lent-easter for the complete schedule and details.

Worship Notes

THE TEXT OF THE OPENING HYMN was written around 820 C.E. and has been used in Palm Sunday processions ever since. The text was written by Theodolph of Orléans who was born around 760 and became Bishop of Orléans in 781. He was later imprisoned for conspiracy against King Louis the Pious and died in prison in 821. The music commonly associated with these words was written by another priest, Melchior Teschner, in 1614.
