Worshiping in Person at Fourth Church

Entering the building

A half hour prior to each service the doors open for worship, with three fully accessible entrances, without steps, that lead to the Sanctuary: on Michigan Avenue, through the glass Loggia doors (between the courtyard and the main Sanctuary doors) as well as at 126 E. Chestnut—where the reception desk is located—and 115 E. Delaware.

Michigan, enter from Delaware or Chestnut) for \$10 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Validation tickets for the garages must be picked up from ushers.

Worship Notes

THE OPENING HYMN, "Come, Worship God," is based on Psalm 95—often called Venite from its first word in Latin—which has long served as an opening canticle in the worship liturgy of Western Christianity. Protestant Reformer John Calvin found here two reasons to praise God: for sustaining the created world and for adopting the church into a gracious relationship.

THE ANTHEM "Listen, Sweet Dove" draws its text from an excerpt of the poem "Whitsunday" by English poet and priest George Herbert (1593–1633), which Katherine Burk set to music in 2021.
