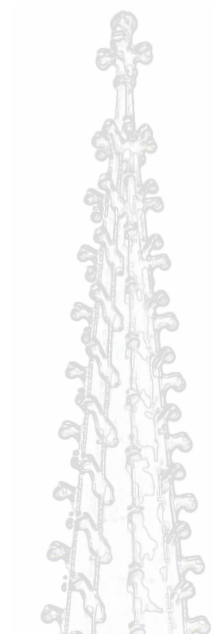

This may be your first time in worship at Fourth Presbyterian Church, or perhaps you worship here so often you call Fourth Church “home”; in either case, **we are grateful for your presence** today. Inspired by the radical hospitality of Jesus Christ, we welcome everyone—without exception—into the life of this congregation. No matter where you may be in your faith journey, no matter what questions or burdens you may bring to this place, we take seriously that God loves everyone, so you belong here.

Every Sunday we read the old biblical stories and sing hymns (some of which our grandparents sang), while also engaging the world we live in this minute through liturgy, prayers, and sermons. **By connecting the story of our lives to the story of Christ’s life**, we discover hope and even joy, and are inspired to reflect the light of Christ to the city.

Worshiping in Person at Fourth Church

Each Sunday our worshiping body is a wonderful mix of those online, on the phone, and in the pews. If you like to worship with us in person, we gather at 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

Entering the building

A half hour prior to each Sunday service the doors open for worship, with three fully accessible entrances, without steps, that lead to the Sanctuary: on Michigan Avenue, through the glass Loggia doors (*between the courtyard and the main Sanctuary doors*) as well as at 126 E. Chestnut—where the reception desk is located—and at 115 E. Delaware.

Parking

Sunday parking is available at 900 N. Michigan (*access from Rush or Walton*) at the rate of \$9 for 6 hours (*and \$18 for up to 12 hours*) and at the Hancock garage (875 N. Michigan, *enter from Delaware or Chestnut*) for \$10 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Validation tickets for the garages must be picked up from ushers.

Q. Why are we being invited to increase our pledges by 15 percent?

A. We know this is a big ask, but the church has never needed it more. In order to get us to a sustainable financial position, we must both reduce expenses and increase generosity. Guided by priorities of the long-range plan, our governing boards will make substantial cuts to our expenses. You will feel these reductions. At the same time, we cannot rely on budget cuts alone, and we must increase our annual giving. If we can absorb these cuts in ministry that are required and also increase our generosity by 15 percent, we can accelerate our path to funding our ministry on reliable and recurring sources of funding.

Worship Notes

Gabriel Fauré (1845–1924) composed his *Requiem in D Minor* between 1887 and 1890. Fauré wrote of the work, “Everything I managed to entertain by way of religious illusion I put into my *Requiem*, which moreover is dominated from beginning to end by a very human feeling of faith in eternal rest.” Fauré claimed not have written the piece “for” anything or anyone (he began composing it after his father’s death but before his mother’s); he wrote it “for pleasure, if I may call it that!”

Fauré told an interviewer, “It has been said that my *Requiem* does not express the fear of death, and someone has called it a lullaby of death. But it is thus that I see death: as a happy deliverance, an aspiration towards happiness above, rather than as a painful experience.”
