Christmas Eve

This evening we are livestreaming the 8:00 service. If you are joining us online, please let us know you are here by filling out an information form, which takes only 20 seconds to complete. The link appears in the text below the video (after exiting full-screen view); a QR code displayed during the service can be scanned with a phone camera to take you to the form. ** Discounted parking is only available at the 900 N. Michigan garage, at the rate of \$9 for 6 hours (and \$18 for up to 12 hours) when using a validation ticket picked up from one of the ushers when exiting the Sanctuary. ** On Christmas Eve and Christmas Day there is no nursery care. As on Sundays, children are invited to be with their parents in worship.

Christmas Day

Michigan garage and will cost \$20. Those parking validations can be purchased (cash only) in the Fourth Church Commons tomorrow morning prior to returning to the garage after worship. ** While we will not be livestreaming the Christmas Day service, we encourage those looking for an **online option on Christmas Day** to view any of our past seasonal offerings, including tonight's service, available on YouTube (bit.ly/fpcvideos). We will also be sharing there tomorrow morning a brief **Christmas "Rhythm and Word" video**, offering scripture, music, and a reflection for Christmas Day.
