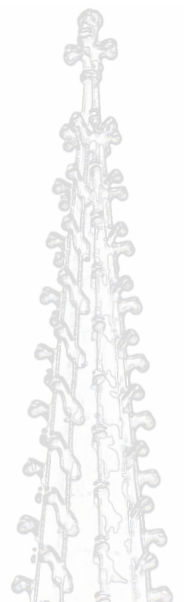

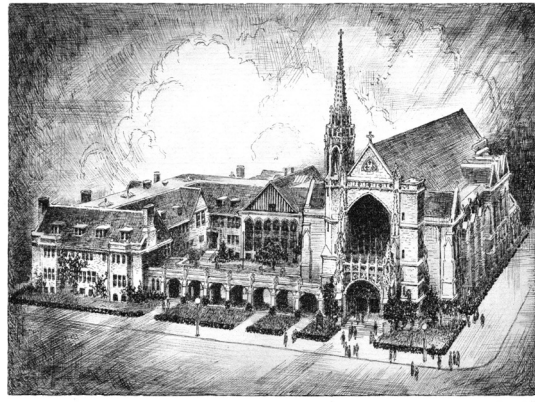

## We're Looking for Church Leadership Recommendations
